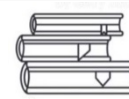
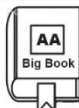

A NEW AA FILM FOR TREATMENT FACILITIES: “HOPE”

“After I get out of treatment and join AA, those people will help me find a job.”

“My wife's left me, but AA members will show me how to get her back.”

“Alcohol isn't my main problem, but AA meetings will help with all my difficulties.”

Misconceptions such as these among alcoholics coming to AA from treatment facilities formed the primary reason for developing and producing the film “Hope: Alcoholics Anonymous.” Approved by the General Service Conference in April 1990, the film went through a lengthy process of review by the Conference and by the Trustees' Committee on Treatment Facilities.

“**Hope: Alcoholics Anonymous**” was envisioned at first as a way of informing alcoholics in treatment, as well as treatment facilities administrators, about what AA is--and is not. Since it demonstrates clearly and simply many fundamental principles and practices of our program, it can also serve a variety of general purposes in AA service, such as letting AA groups know what new members have been told about AA, and making sure that any AA member is well informed about the Fellowship. Service committees such as public information, cooperation with the professional community, and correctional facilities are finding it a clear, concise way of explaining AA to alcoholics and nonalcoholics alike.

“**Hope**” was written and produced by Karen and David Crommie, who brought the experience of three previous AA films and a number of television public service announcements to their task, it begins with a disclaimer and, observing the Traditions of anonymity, shows no faces. The characters represent a racial and ethnic mix.

As the film opens, a man is getting ready for his first AA birthday, and he serves as the Narrator as we follow him to the meeting. In flashbacks, he remembers his drinking, recalls how he came to AA, and reflects on what his life is like in sobriety. Voice-over conversations with other members illuminate what AA is and isn't, our primary purpose, sponsorship, slips, the importance of a home group, the Steps and Traditions, and other basic recovery tools.

The impact of a year's sobriety is captured in the Narrator's closing words: “A year has passed since I've had a drink, and I'm proud of me. Maybe the hardest thing I had to learn, and the most valuable, was that crazy as it sounds, you just don't pick up the first drink. And you do it a day at a time. Sometimes an hour at a time. It's been the bravest thing I've ever done because I had to put my sobriety first and respect myself, and I needed to grow up to do that. At times it was hard, but I didn't have to do it alone - and you don't either.”

The film is available from the General Service Office in both 16mm and video cassette form, with closed captions for the hearing impaired, for \$15. Both Spanish and French soundtracks will be available soon.

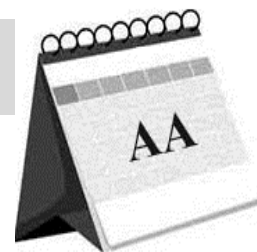
Achieving projects and proposals examples:

The No. 1 Disappearing Book

Distributing AA literature is part of his service. If only he could keep enough books on the shelf

After the next district meeting, I walked out of the meeting having been elected CPC/PI chair. I didn't even know what the letters stood for. I felt totally inadequate. My sponsor said they had my back, that I would learn AA is a "we" program and not to worry.

The two plus years flew by. After I had recruited a small CPC committee of AA volunteers, a number of service projects were implemented:

- Placing "Drinking Problem?" cards with our district hotline telephone number written on them, in doctors' offices and hospital reception areas.
- Sending copies of the *Big Book* to all the middle and high school libraries. These two projects had something in common: the cards and the copies of the *Big Book* disappeared continuously. Librarians told me the *Big Book* was their number one disappearing book, so it must have aroused a tremendous amount of interest with the students.
- Attended a variety of health fairs using the area's display, which led to additional professional inquiries.

"It is so good to be made to feel welcome and 'a part of,' especially when you have a disability," says Lee, a deaf member in "A.A. for the Alcoholic With Special Needs." "I have come to realize that deafness, like alcoholism, is surmountable when I make use of the help that is available."

John, a deaf and blind member, says in the pamphlet: "I understand how important it is for people who are deaf, hard of hearing and deaf-blind to stay sober, and they have a greater chance of relapse if they don't have interpreters. It is vital that the communication is there between deaf and hearing members. I'm grateful to God and AA for the restoration of my sobriety and a new life."

Disability Avenues Available now are: The American Sign Language translation of "AA for the Alcoholic With Special Needs" on DVD and CD Audio (Spanish) (English) (French). Included are personal stories and special needs circumstances.

Big Book and "Twelve and Twelve" are now out as eBooks

AA's two central texts describing the program of action for recovery from alcoholism are now available in **eBook format** English, French and Spanish.

Publication in this digital media format will give broader distribution and access to AA's basic textbook, *Alcoholics Anonymous*, known popularly as the *Big Book*.

"We are thrilled at the prospect of reaching an even wider audience to offer AA's message of hope to the still-suffering alcoholic who may not have had access to our basic literature."

AA members, many of whom read, re-read and quote from the literature at AA meetings as part of their recovery, will be able to search for specific passages quickly and highlight key words and sentences in the highly portable format.

It is often said at AA meetings that there's your way and there's AA's way.

The clear implication is that you'd better do it AA's way, or else. The less clear, but often very real, implication of such pronouncements is that the speaker already knows AA's way and that you'd better do it his or her way, or else. The underlying premise is that there's a single uniform AA way of getting sober, "one-size-fits-all" variety for everybody.

Yet, there are many "AA ways" to recovery, just as there are many varieties of alcoholism. How often has a speaker at a meeting announced that they knew they were not an alcoholic because they never drank in public, only to be followed by another speaker who knew they were not an alcoholic because they only drank in public? The list of such varying perceptions of the symptoms of alcoholism could go on and on. Varieties of successful AA recoveries are equally diverse.

The recorded experience of the early members of **AA indicates many ways to recovery**. While the call is to "thoroughly follow our path," the material that follows demonstrates the many paths taken by early AA's. Again the Big Book covers the spectrum not only of the varieties of alcoholic symptoms. Chapter Five, entitled, "How It Works," is scattered with comments setting out differences, ". . . on the other hand"; "Some of us had great self-confidence [obviously, some did not]; "One school would allow man no flavor to his fare and the other would have us all on a straight pepper diet"; "Whatever our ideal turns out to be". And on it goes.

Chapter Seven, entitled, "Working With Others," containing AA's "Twelfth Suggestion", is equally pragmatic. "Sometimes it is wise to wait..."; "...never force yourself upon him"; "You will get a better idea of how you ought to proceed"; "Let him draw his own conclusion"; "He can choose any conception he likes, provided it makes sense to him"; "He should not be pushed or prodded by you"; "If he thinks he can do the job some other way, or prefers some other spiritual approach, encourage him to follow his own conscience. We have no monopoly on God." Again, the list goes on and on. The practical aspects of Twelfth Step recovery work set out in the "Twelve and Twelve" is even more varied.

There are many AA paths to recovery. AA's greatest gift to the alcoholic seeking recovery is to help the alcoholic find the path that is right for him or her. That part of the "your-way-and-AA's-way" pronouncement is all too true. But the phrase might better be stated not as, "There's your way and there's AA's way," but rather as, "There's your way and there's an AA way for you. Your way didn't work. Based on the experience of many AA's in recovery, there's an AA way for you. Your job, with AA's help, is to find it."
